



Elijah Anderson is the William K. Lanman, Jr. Professor of Sociology at Yale University. He is one of the leading urban ethnographers in the United States and the 2013 recipient of the prestigious Cox-Johnson-Frazier Award of the American Sociological Association. His publications include Code of the Street: Decency, Violence, and the Moral Life of the Inner City (1999), winner of the Komarovsky Award from the Eastern Sociological Society; Streetwise: Race, Class, and Change in an Urban Community (1990), winner of the American Sociological Association's Robert E. Park Award for the best published book in the area of Urban Sociology; and most recently The Cosmopolitan Canopy: Race and Civility in Everyday Life (WW Norton, 2012).
