



Meeting Guide: JUSTICE

Check in on experience with the last month's virtue. – Sincerity

This month's virtue: Justice

Franklin's precept for justice: "Wrong none, by doing injuries or omitting the benefits that are your duty."

What does this mean to you?

Sample questions:

- Franklin's precept for justice seems to be do no harm. Is that a good definition?
 What's your definition of justice? What do you think society's definition is?
- The phrase "social justice" gets thrown around a lot. What does it mean exactly?
 Are social justice and justice different?
- Can you think of any paragons of justice?
- What's the best way to respond after you've been unjust to someone? What's the best way to respond after someone has been unjust to you?
- Is there something you identify in the community as a sign of injustice? How often do you find yourself speaking out against it?

- Commit to one civic activity in the next month. Could you volunteer in your community? Attend a local community board meeting?
- Is there something you see happening in the community that you think is unjust? Can you commit to finding a way to speak up about it?
